Our Climate Justice Candle – the journey continues!

We invite you to join our <u>Shine a Light on Climate Justice</u> Initiative, which sees our specially commissioned climate justice candle visiting one church each week over the next 12 months. During that time, each church is asked to light the candle and to incorporate a climate justice theme into their services. Some churches may choose to use the attached service while others might want to adapt the service in a way that suits them; others may choose to simply include a few environmental prayers in their prayers of intercession. This initiative



was launched at the <u>National Ecumenical Prayer Service</u> in the presence of President Michael D Higgins that we hosted with Trócaire and Christian Aid in November 2015.

Since our last newsletter, the candle has visited Rathmichael Church of Ireland, Holy Redeemer Catholic Church Bray, St Peter's Catholic Church Little Bray, Kilternan Church of Ireland, Christ Church Church of Ireland Bray, Delgany Church of Ireland, Greystones Church of Ireland and Greystones Catholic Church.

Christ Church in Bray used the candle in their Parish Fete and had it lit throughout (see photo). During July and August, the candle will remain at Brigidine Retreat Centre, Tullow, Co Carlow where it will be used with the various groups passing through the centre over the summer.

Rev John Corrie, ECI Methodist representative, attends garden party at Áras an Uachtaráin

Rev John Corrie and his wife Jan attended a garden party at Áras an Uachtaráin on 9 June 2016 to represent Eco-Congregation Ireland. John is the Methodist representative on the ECI committee. The garden party was held to acknowledge individuals and organisations working to achieve the United Nations Sustainable Development goals agreed in New York in 2015. The mixture of guests attending represented farming, business, industry, non-governmental organisations, charities, community groups and individuals. A very wide range of people with a common aim. President Higgins gave a short address, thanking those present for their role in helping Ireland work towards the sustainable development goals set globally. He stressed the



need to convert words into actions in relation to these goals and the necessity of addressing climate change at community and individual level and the changes that are needed at the level of political policy and individual action. Read John's full report of this event here.

Irish Quakers Commit to Sustainability and Ethical Investments

Quaker Meetings in Ireland are set to become "as sustainable as possible", following a resolution made by Ireland Yearly Meeting (IYM) on 3rd April 2016. Each Meeting is asked to develop a sustainability plan before January 2017, taking into consideration factors such as accessibility by public transport, energy efficiency, use of Fairtrade tea and coffee and use of organic and locally sourced food, when possible.

A commitment was also made to develop an investment strategy by January 2017 to ethically invest all funds within Yearly Meeting in sustainable and peaceful companies,



and to divest from destructive industries, including fossil fuels. These two commitments were made following a call to action on sustainability that came from the Friends World Committee for Consultation's Plenary in Peru in January 2016, urging the worldwide Quaker community to re-double its efforts in relation to sustainability.

Sr Catherine Brennan, ECI Catholic representative, attends the 11th Assembly of European Christian Environmental Network, Helsinki, 11-15 June 2016

Sr Catherine Brennan, Catholic representative on the Eco-Congregation Ireland committee attended the 11th Assembly of the European Christian Environmental Network in Helsinki. The theme of the Assembly was 'Water in a Sustainable Future'. More than 80 delegates from 23 countries from all regions of Europe

gathered for a time of prayer, discussion, and networking.

The Assembly took place shortly after the historic Paris Agreement on climate change. The



theme 'Water in a Sustainable Future' was developed around the relationship between climate change, the water cycle, and efforts for sustainable development. The Assembly offered a venue for sharing and strengthening cooperation, and to further encourage the churches' work in the post-Paris era. Presentations addressed the theme from scientific, policy, and theological perspectives. These are available to read here.

At the close of the Assembly, the delegates approved a statement emphasising the theological and biblical imperative to work for water justice, and a call to action for individuals and churches. Creation Time - 1 September to 4 October 2016 – resources now available


Eco-Congregation Scotland has published material for use by congregations during Creation Time 2016. The material comes from an ecumenical writing group, with contributors from the Church of Scotland, the Scottish Episcopal Church and the United Reformed Church. It follows the theme, 'Followers of Jesus, Caring for Creation',



emphasising the readings from the Gospel of Luke which appear in the Revised Common Lectionary in September. The materials can be found here.

Craig Bennett, head of Friends of the Earth, said the leave vote was a "red alert" for the environment. He stated 'The fight starts now to make sure that the UK doesn't water-down environmental safeguards that have been inherited from the European Union. The priority will be to ensure that every MP understands loud and clear that the referendum



result was not a mandate to weaken our environmental protection'. Read more here. Irish Environmental Network reported that public figures and NGOs in the UK have expressed concern over new UK Prime Minister, Theresa May's decision to abolish the Department of Energy and Climate Change (DECC).
