SAGE, Shankill Action for a Green Earth, is an ecumenical initiative of the Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland parishes in Shankill. Their objective is to promote awareness of climate change in the wider community and to promote action to conserve energy. ## **Daughters of Charity review their work on Laudato Si**

On 28th January 2017 approximately 110 Daughters of Charity gathered in their Provincial House in Blackrock Dublin. Part of this day was devoted to a mid-year review of their work on Laudato Si. As part of their Province Plan drawn up in 2016, each Daughter of Charity in the Province of Ireland committed to 'educate ourselves towards a new understanding of our place within the universe in order to have a change of heart and embrace an ethical use of the earth's resources' (Province Plan p. 8).



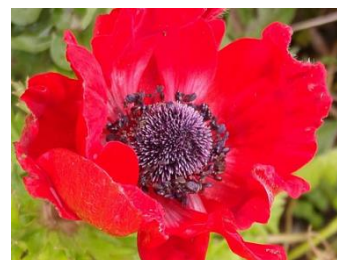
There are 23 local communities of the Daughters of Charity in Ireland and 5 communities in Kenya. All of these local groups worked on the first three chapters of the encyclical from September to December 2016. In order to help them the Formation Commission provided a Laudato Si study guide to help the Sisters navigate their way through the encyclical and also to reflect on relevant Vincentian texts. At this half way point the Sisters thought it would be good to have some input from Eco-Congregation Ireland and Sr Catherine Brennan, Catholic representative on the Eco-Congregation Ireland committee, delivered an inspirational and informative presentation to the Sisters. 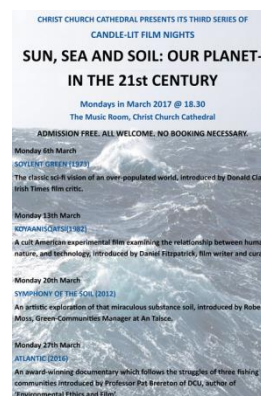

## Third Christ Church Cathedral Film Series focuses on the Environment

'Sun, Sea and Soil: Our Planet in the 21st Century' was the theme of the third Christ Church Cathedral Film Series which began on Monday March 6<sup>th</sup>. There were four films, all with an environmental focus, in this series and all were screened in the cathedral's candle-lit Music Room.

The series opened on Monday March 6 with *Soylent Green* (1973) which was introduced by Donald Clarke, Irish Times film critic. On Monday March 13 the film *Koyaanisqatsi* (1982) was introduced by Daniel Fitzpatrick, film writer and curator. On Monday March 20 *Symphony of the Soil* (2012) was introduced by Robert Moss, Green Communities Manager at An Taisce and on Monday March 27 the film was *Atlantic* (2016) and it was introduced by Prof Pat Brereton from DCU, author of the recently published 'Environmental Ethics and Film'. Parishioners and clergy from across the Cashel, Ferns and Ossory Diocese came in large numbers to Kilkenny College on Saturday, 18th February to learn ways of improving their church properties, inside and out. A number also teamed up with parishes which have already been grant-aided to carry out work. There was good collaboration between Roman Catholic, Methodist and Church of Ireland parishioners represented at this 'Inside & Out' conference. Speakers included Ruth Buggie from the Sustainable Energy Agency of Ireland (SEAI), Dr Úna Fitzpatrick from the National Biodiversity Data Centre and Alison Harvey from the Heritage Council. ## Church of the Three Patrons, Rathgar – Meditation and Caring for the Earth

Parishioners from Church of the Three Patrons, Rathgar invited Fr Donagh O'Shea OP, Director of the Dominican Retreat Centre to give a talk to them entitled 'Meditation and Caring for the Earth' on the 20th of February last. In his reflection Fr Donagh identified three ways in which through meditation 'being' can help us in our 'doing.' Firstly, over time meditation increases the sense of the sacred. That becomes particularly evident in how we experience nature. Secondly, meditation increases our awareness so we actually become aware of ways in which we can protect and care for our environment. Thirdly, one of the fruits of meditation is that it helps us let go of our ego so our need for domination weakens over time. Gradually it becomes more a case of 'thy will be done' rather than 'my will be done'. Read more [here](#).
